6	Samuel Coleridge-Taylor (1875-1912) British	Romantic African-European composer of choral/vocal orchestral and chamber music
6	Ross Lee Finney (1906-1997) American	Composer of chamber, choral, and choral-orchestral music in a Post-Schoenbergian Serialist style
6	Jean Françaix (1912-1997) French	French Neoclassical composer of concertos and chamber music featuring wind instruments featuring a refined style
6	Alexander Gretchaninov (1864-1956) Russian	Conservative composer of Nationalist/Romantic style liturgical, orchestral and stage works, and music for children
6	Heinz Holliger (1939-) Swiss	Oboe virtuoso whose modernist music, including many works for oboe, embraces avant-garde and serial techniques
6	Leos Janácek (1854-1928) Moravian	Czech Nationalist composer influenced by the Romantics, Expressionists, and Eastern European folk music
6	Sigfrid Karg-Elert (1877-1933) German	Impressionist especially known for chamber music and works for solo organ and harmonium
6	Constant Lambert (1905-1951) British	Composer of ballets and orchestral pieces influenced by American jazz and ragtime, French neoclassicism, and medieval music
6	Otto Luening (1900-1996) American-German	Eclectic stylistically (Avant-garde, Neoclassical, etc.); composer of chamber music, orchestral pieces, electronic music, etc.
6	Luis de Milán (c1500-c1561) Spanish	Renaissance figure best known for his songs and music for vihuela
6	Luigi Nono (1924-1990) Italian	Avant-garde composer known for his stage works, music on political subjects, and electronic music
6	Michael Nyman (1944-) British	Experimentalist/Minimalist composer best known for his film scores and chamber music
6	Harry Partch (1901-1974) American	Experimentalist/Exoticist composer with diverse influences; known for ensemble music based on invented instruments
6	Johann Strauss Sr. (1804-1849) Austrian	Composer of light classical music: orchestral waltzes, marches, quadrilles, polkas, and galops
6	Tielman Susato (c1510/15-1570+) Flemish	Renaissance composer of masses, chansons, and instrumental dances; also involved in music publishing
