Clinical Psychology Update

Introducing

I'd like to take this opportunity to introduce our new Clinical class. As always, I am impressed with the credentials of this year's incoming class, and very excited about having them join us on campus. We were able to accept eleven new students this year, who came to our program from all over the nation. Overall, they had an average undergraduate GPA of 3.38, an average GPA in Psychology of 3.54, a GRE Verbal score of 456, GRE Quantitative score of 565, a GRE Written score of 4.2, and a total GRE score of 1020. Two of the students have made at least one professional presentation. Eight of the students have applied clinical experience, ranging from working with a geriatric population to administering suicide prevention programs to working at an adolescent inpatient facility. This year six of the students are home-grown, having graduated from Western Kentucky University. The other six students are nationally recruited: one comes from the State University of New York—Utica, one comes from the University of Iowa, one comes from the University of Dayton, one comes from the Campbellsville University, and one attended the University of Tennessee. We are very excited to have such a diverse group of quality students begin the program and look forward to working with them over the next two years.
